The Clerk reported that he had obtained a copy of the depositions upon which the justices made their order adjudging Mary Shanks, recently a pauper lunatic, to be chargeable to this Union, and stated that he thought that the pauper was not irremovable when she was sent to the Asylum, and that the order of justices was properly made and could not be appealed against. A cheque being the amount ordered to be re-paid to the Tynemouth Union to be made out.

The Assessment Committee had considered the salary to be paid to E Willoby, their clerk, for his services during this past year. An amount was agreed upon and the Clerk was ordered to inform the Poor Law Board thereof.

Inquiries regarding the irremoveability under the provision of the Union Chargeability Act to be made of those paupers who receive non-resident relief from this Union. To be considered at the next meeting.

County of Northumberland patients cannot be interfered with.

Resolved that the Union Clerk communicate with William Dickson and remind him that the lunatics mentioned are all chargeable to this Union's Common Fund, and that the large part of that fund is contributed to by parishes situated within the County of Northumberland. Request him to enquire by what authority the Guardians under these circumstances be requested to remove the lunatics in question.

A further circular received from the Poor Law Board regarding that part of the Union Chargeability Act of 1865 which relates to the removal of paupers. In accordance with the Poor Law Board's recommendation to appoint a committee to deal with the question of removability of paupers it was resolved that the Workhouse and Finance Committee be constituted as a committee for this purpose.

T H Mitchell [Thomas Hood Mitchell] presented a partial result of his visit to the non-resident poor. It was deemed expedient that the result should first be referred to the Relieving Officers and that the cases requiring the Guardians' interference should be brought before them at the next meeting.

Letter from the General Register Office saying there is no statutory power to alter Registrars' districts. George A Turnbull, Schoolmaster, Ancroft. Was appointed to replace Mr Grahame as Registrar of Births and Deaths for the District of Islandshire.

Letter from the Clerk to the Visitors of the County Asylum. They have taken the opinion of Mr Manisty regarding the Berwick Union placing pauper lunatics belonging to the Borough of Berwick in the Northumberland County Asylum as a matter of right. It states that opinion expressed by the Berwick Guardians cannot be maintained as they have not contributed towards the County Asylum. The pauper lunatics belonging to the County of Berwick therefore have to be removed from the County Asylum. A list of the lunatics to be removed enclosed [but not included in the minutes].

The Clerk reported that he had applied to the Dumfries & Dunston Lodge Asylums for the admission of the lunatics, but without success, advertisements have also been placed in newspapers with no result. Matter to be referred back to plan a possible course.

Report from Dr Brown [Colville Brown] on behalf of the committee appointed to visit the Northumberland County Asylum, regarding his visit to the Asylum together with the Chairman and Dr Richardson [Henry Richardson]. There were 29 (12 male and 17 female) inmates from the Berwick Union. They were all well cared for and clean and tidy. 4 patients (Thomas Stevens, James Mitchell, Ann Weir and Elizabeth McNab) suffer from epilepsy, and as there is no cure, their cases must be deemed hopeless. They are all in good bodily health but dangerous to others after a fit. William Pennan and Patrick Hughes are suffering from melancholia but are rapidly improving. Nolan William Bertram and George Todd are also expected to recover. Of the remainder 3 may be set down as hopeless as is the case of John Howe who is dying of pulmonary consumption. Mary Turner should be brought back at once as she is of sound mind and far advanced in pregnancy. Mary Ann Brown should be taken out on trial even though there is a danger of relapse. Sarah Ewart suffering from disease of the brain and paralysis, could possibly be kept in our own infirmary. Jane Heslop and Jane Smith are both hopeless cases and the remaining female afford little or no hope of recovery.

Copy of the report to be sent to the Superintendent of the Asylum and a request that

Report from the Lunatic Asylum Committee regarding the admission of lunatics in this Union to an asylum. They report that they have received a letter from the Clerk to the Committee of Visitors of the Northumberland County Asylum saying that they had

been advised by Mr Manisty Q C that pauper lunatics whose settlement is in the Borough of Berwick have no claim to be admitted into the County Asylum, and that the Visitors request the 22 lunatics, whose names are enclosed, who belong to the Borough be removed. Applications had been made to the Dumfries Asylum and Dunston Lodge Asylum, both have previously been used by the Guardians, but both institutions had declined to receive the Borough lunatics, consequently the Guardians had advertised for an asylum for the Borough lunatics in certain provincial newspapers circulated in the north of England and Scotland as well as in the Times and the Lancet. Only one offer had been received from the Fisherton House Asylum, Salisbury. As this is the only offer the Guardians find that, in spite of the great distance, they see no alternative but to recommend that the chronic cases amongst the present Borough lunatics should at once be sent there.

The list of lunatics to be removed contains 22 lunatics, 5 chargeable to the Borough Rate and not under the control of the Guardians, one has died and another been removed. Of the remaining 18 one is the son of a respectable tradesman in Berwick, subject to epilepsy but otherwise sane. His friends have offered to take care of him. 5 other lunatics are recommended to be removed to the Workhouse. Also recommended that 3 other lunatics, Isabella May; Jane Smith and William Pennan be removed to the Workhouse as well, or possibly be allowed to stay a bit longer in the Asylum till their progressing recovery is complete. 12 cases remain viz. George Todd; James Swinhoe; John Octon; Charles Hunter Macdonald; James Finharty; Ann Graham; Agnes Pringle; Martha Forster; Isabella Lough; Margaret Dryden; Jane Heslop and Elizabeth Trainer. They are all deemed to be chronic cases and should be immediately removed to Fisherton House Asylum.

The Committee has considered steps to be taken for obtaining an asylum for lunatics becoming chargeable. Two proposals were submitted:

- 1. To contract with the Committee of Visitors of the County Asylum for the reception of the pauper lunatics of the Borough into the County Asylum, as it is being enlarged.
- 2. That an asylum should be erected by and at the expense of the parishes situated within the County of the Borough and Town of Berwick-on-Tweed. The Committee think that in spite of having no claim to the use of the County Asylum for the Borough lunatics compared to the part of the Union within the County of Northumberland, they hope that they will receive a fair consideration from the Visitors of the County Asylum.

The whole rateable value of the Union is £119,000, of this £77,000 is within the County of Northumberland, and the properties representing the latter sum has contributed towards the erection of the County Asylum. Whilst out of the 30 lunatics at present chargeable to this Union only in respect of 7 is the claim allowed for them to be maintained in the County Asylum. Owing to lunatics being a charge upon the Common Fund of the Union the greater share of any additional expense incurred for the other 23 lunatics has to be borne by the parishes within the County, thereby entailing upon them a hardship from which the remainder of the County is exempt. As it is likely that the Law of Settlement may be abolished shortly and if an agreement is not reached between the Borough and County authorities considerable legal difficulties may arise. The report to be sent to the Visitors of the County Asylum, the Commissioners in Lunacy and the Poor Law Board.

The Lunatic Asylum Committee to be requested and authorised to arrange a meeting with the Committee of Visitors of the County Asylum to urge upon the Visitors the claims of this Union and to come to some agreement for the reception into the County Asylum of all the lunatics chargeable to this Union.

The Clerk reported that the contracts for provisions, clothing etc. will expire on 29th instant. Referred to the Workhouse Committee.

The Workhouse and Finance Committee had inspected the Clerk's calculations for estimating the sums required to be contributed by the parishes during the ensuing half year.

The Clerk had obtained a copy of an order upon which the Justices had made an order for the removal of 4 children named Bruce from the Newcastle-upon-Tyne Union to this Union. Resolved that the Guardians have no objection to the removal.

George A Turnbull, Registrar of Births and Deaths for the District of Islandshire, named Henry Ford, of Cheswick, schoolmaster, as his Deputy.

The Committee state 4 reasons for the propriety of the Borough uniting with the County, and conclude that the patients at present in the County Asylum should not be moved for at least a month to allow time for consideration of the proposal. Data for the unification were produced. In conclusion: what the Visitors require is that the Borough of Berwick should place themselves in the same position as if they had joined in the erection of the Asylum, but without taking into account any interest upon the advanced made by the County up to the 29th Sept. 1865.

Letter from the Poor Law Board on the subject of apportioning the extra charges made by the Visitors of the County Asylum in respect of the Borough lunatics, stating that they had prepared a clause to meet the difficulty, which they hope will be introduced into a bill to be laid before Parliament this session.

Copy of report by Dr Nairne, Commissioner in Lunacy, on his visit to the Berwick Workhouse was presented. It states that there are five men and seven women in the Workhouse who are of unsound mind. Two women in the female lunatic ward, the others distributed among the ordinary pauper inmates. They are all deemed harmless and may properly be retained in the Workhouse. The day-room and bedrooms were clean, no oakum picking in the men's day-room. Two lunatics chargeable to this Union in the Asylum at Dumfries, and one in the Asylum at Morningside, near Edinburgh.

Letter from the Poor Law Board with reference to the suspension by the Guardians of Robert Stamp, Collector of Rates for Holy Island. The Poor Law Board have required Mr Stamp to furnish them with an immediate explanation of his conduct, and upon receiving his reply they will again communicate with the Guardians on the subject.

The Clerk produced and Order of Justices adjudging the chargeability to the Union of Mary Shanks, a pauper lunatic sent by the Guardians of the Tynemouth Union to the Northumberland County Asylum. Repayment ordered to the Tynemouth Union for the expenses incurred and payment of the future cost of the lunatic's maintenance in the

The fact that Mr Stamp has been re-instated does not change this. If the Guardians decide not to release him from his bond, he wants the case to be put in front of the Poor Law Commissioners.

The Guardians decided to report to the Poor Law Board that Mr Stamp continues to comply with the Guardians' request to furnish them with monthly statements.

The Workhouse Committee reported that they had considered the circular received from the Poor Law Board with the report of Dr Smith on the subject of workhouse dietary. This, together with the statement of the Master of the Workhouse, satisfied the Workhouse Committee that the dietary in use is ample and well-suited to the inmates and does not require any alterations. The 2 statements to be kept by the Master for the guidance.

The Relieving Officers produced a circular from the District Auditor with reference to an examination into the accuracy of their Relief List prior to the ensuing audit.

At Cat Inn, Cheswick – Guardians present: Messrs Andrew Thompson; John Embleton; David Tait; Richard Makins and Rev Thomas Proctor and also Dr Wilson. 47 cases were investigated representing 87 poor persons.

For the Norhamshire District – Thursday 4 July 1867 at Collingwood Arms, Cornhill. Guardians present: Messrs Andrew Thompson and Robert Brown. 10m cases were investigated representing 17 poor persons. At Victoria Inn, Norham. Guardians present: Messrs Andrew Thompson and Robert Brown. 67 cases were investigated representing 109 poor persons. At Horncliffe. Guardians present: Messrs Andrew Thompson and John Brown. 8 cases were investigated representing 10 poor people. Altogether an increase of 34 cases and 38 poor persons compared with last year.

The Clerk reported that, as directed, he had given notice to Robert Stamp, late Collector of Poor Rates for the Parish of Holy Island, and his sureties, requiring payment before this meeting of the balances certified by the District Auditor to be due from Mr Stamp. The amount had not been paid. On the motion of Adam Darling it was resolved to await the result of the proceeding intended to be taken by the District Auditor against Mr Stamp before taking proceeding against the sureties.

The Clerk presented a bill which had been introduced in Parliament to make sundry amendments in the law for the relief of the poor and which contains a clause requiring the town councils of boroughs to pay the extra sums chargeable for lunatics sent from a borough to the county asylums.

The Clerk produced a notice of chargeability and Order of Removal received by him from Morpeth Union for Elizabeth Purves, widow, and whose maiden settlement is alleged to be in the Parish of Kyloe in this Union, as it appeared that her late husband's settlement is alleged to be unknown, it was ordered that the Clerk be authorised to obtain copies of the deposition taken in this case and to make such further enquiries as he may deem necessary to ascertain the truth of the allegations made by the Guardians of the Morpeth Union, and report at the next meeting.

The consideration of the case of Elizabeth Johnston, now living in the Glendale Union was deferred to the next meeting as Mr Scott [Joseph Scott] had not completed his enquiries.

John Atkinson, tailor, Lowick, and his apprentice Alexander Williams, attended the meeting, and the Guardians having heard the statements of both parties, directed that the apprentice should return to his service and conduct himself properly, and that

The Clerk presented a report upon the manner of charging in the Guardians' accounts the payment made to Mr Hedley for rating the properties of the railway companies and certain others situated in certain parishes in this Union. The Clerk says in his report that as the law is not very clear on this matter he had contacted the Poor Law Board for their advice, and based on this he had worked out how much Mr Hedley should be paid.

Resolved that the report be received and approved by the Guardians and payment ordered to Mr Hedley.

The Clerk presented the half yearly report received from the Superintendent of the County Asylum upon the state and condition of the lunatics chargeable to this Union now being maintained therein.

Resolved that the Chairman and Rev Thomas Proctor and Dr Brown be appointed as

a committee to visit the Northumberland County Asylum and report upon the state and condition of the lunatics chargeable to this Union and now being maintained therein.

A communication was read from J C Weddell, Clerk to the Local Board of Health, relating to the nuisances alleged to exist in Oliver's property in Chapel Street. Dr Fluker stated that he had seen the place this morning and that it had been thoroughly cleaned.

Letter from the Poor Law Board sanctioning the appointment of Robert L Yetts to the Office of Collector of Poor Rates for the Parish of Holy Island.

Ordered that a list of the poor persons now chargeable to this Union be prepared and printed for the use of the Guardians and their officers.

New rules for admitting vagrants into the Workhouse agreed upon. They are: vagrants applying for admission to the Workhouse before 9 o'clock should be required to obtain the Relieving Officer's Order for their admission. Vagrants applying after 9 o'clock shall not be required to obtain an order, but the Master of the Workhouse must himself use such discretion as by law vested in him.

Mr Scott reported the result of his enquiries into the settlement of Elizabeth Johnston, widow, and her 5 children, alleged to be removable from the Glendale Union. Resolved that the Guardians express themselves satisfied that the said paupers are settled within and now removable to this Union from the Glendale Union, and consent to receive the said paupers without an Order of Removal.

The report goes through the case: at a meeting between the Clerk and the District Auditor, the Auditor said that it was absolutely necessary that the accounts of Mr Thompson should be made up and audited at the close of the current rate, before entering upon the collection of a new rate. The Auditor also recommended that the whole subject matter should at once be communicated to the Poor Law Board to obtain their advice and directions. The Auditor had himself been in communication with the Poor Law Board, and he requested that Mr Thompson should at once close his current rate and be ready for a special audit. Resolved by the Guardians that the report be adopted and a copy sent to the Poor Law Board. The report was signed by Andrew Thompson.

The School Committee reported that, as recommended by the Government School Inspector regarding the books to be used in the Workhouse Infant School, they had bought a number of new books to be used there. Due to the late inspection it was decided to defer the annual examination of the School until the week before Christmas. An increase in the salary of the Workhouse School Monitor, Ellen Dalgleish, was accepted from 29 September.

The Clerk reported that the District Auditor had caused Robert Stamp, late Collector of Poor Rates for the Parish of Holy Island, to appear before the Justices due to non-payment by him of his balance certified by the District Auditor. The Justices had ordered immediate payment, and in default, distress, or 6 weeks imprisonment, which proceedings were now being carried out.

			Report by the committee appointed to visit the County Asylum. They found the County Asylum all clean and comfortable with everything necessary for the well-being of the inmates. There are 25 inmates at present. 8 male and 17 female. Regarding the males there is nothing in their antecedent behaviour, the duration of illness or their present state which holds much hope of a recovery. From idiocy, epilepsy or strongly developed hereditary taints, they nearly all are hopelessly insane. An exception is the boy Finharty who is addicted to tearing his clothes, and is of filthy habits and difficult to manage. Regarding the females there are several hopeful cases. Jane Drummond, sent to the Asylum 20 July last is rapidly improving. Ann Tobin, who entered the Asylum in April last, is also a hopeful case. Elizabeth Trainer has improved since last year, and will probably make a good recovery. Isabella Mace, in spite of having spent several years in the Asylum, is still a hopeful case. Jane Hislop is more melancholic depressed since last year. In the case of Isabella Lough some faint hope of recovery is expressed. The remaining 12 cases, from imbecility, epilepsy or total and irretrievable loss of mental power, are all nearly hopeless and mostly harmless. Report signed by Colville Brown. Messrs James Carter, James Keenan and Robert Craik, 3 of the Overseers of the Poor of the Parish of Berwick, attended the meeting at the request of the Chairman in order to make arrangements about the collection of the poor rate just made by them, and upon the present position of their Collector John Thompson who had not yet closed his account with the Local Board of Health, and whose surety to the Board, the Chairman, desired to withdraw and ask the Guardians not to permit Mr Thompson to proceed with the collection of the present poor rate till he has found a surety in the place of the Chairman. Mr Thompson also attended and produced the books of the Parish in present use, but prior to his entering the Board Room he sent in his resignation of the offices of Assistant Overseer and Collector of Poor Rates.

Resolved to appoint a new collector of poor rates for the Parish of Berwick at the next meeting, and that subject to the sanction of the Poor Law Board and the Guardians the remuneration shall be a poundage of sixpence in the pound on the sums collected and accounted for by him. He will be required to enter into a bond with two sufficient sureties for the sum of £400. The Clerk to put advertisements in the local newspapers.

The Workhouse Committee further reported that they had considered the arrangements to be made with Mr Willoby [Edward Willoby], the Superintendent Registrar, upon the removal of the offices for register purposes from the Quay Walls to Mr Willoby's own offices in Ravensdowne. The plans of the new offices, approved of by the Registrar General, were now submitted and accepted by the Committee. The Committee then considered the allowance to be made to Mr Willoby for the use of his offices for register purposes, and the other expenses in connection with it. The present expense is: rent £12; rates £3; coal, gas and sundries £5 - total £20. The Committee resolved to recommend the Guardians to allow Mr Willoby for all these purposes the sum of £15 per annum. Letter from the Poor Law Union sanctioning the increase in salary to George Dick, Collector of Poor Rates for the Parish of Tweedmouth.

The Clerk stated that John Husband, Collector of Poor Rates for the Parish of Berwick, had applied to the European Assurance Society to give the security required from him. He had received a form to be filled in and certified by the Clerk on behalf of

	the Guardians. The Clerk read out the replies filled in by him under the direction of the Workhouse Committee.
